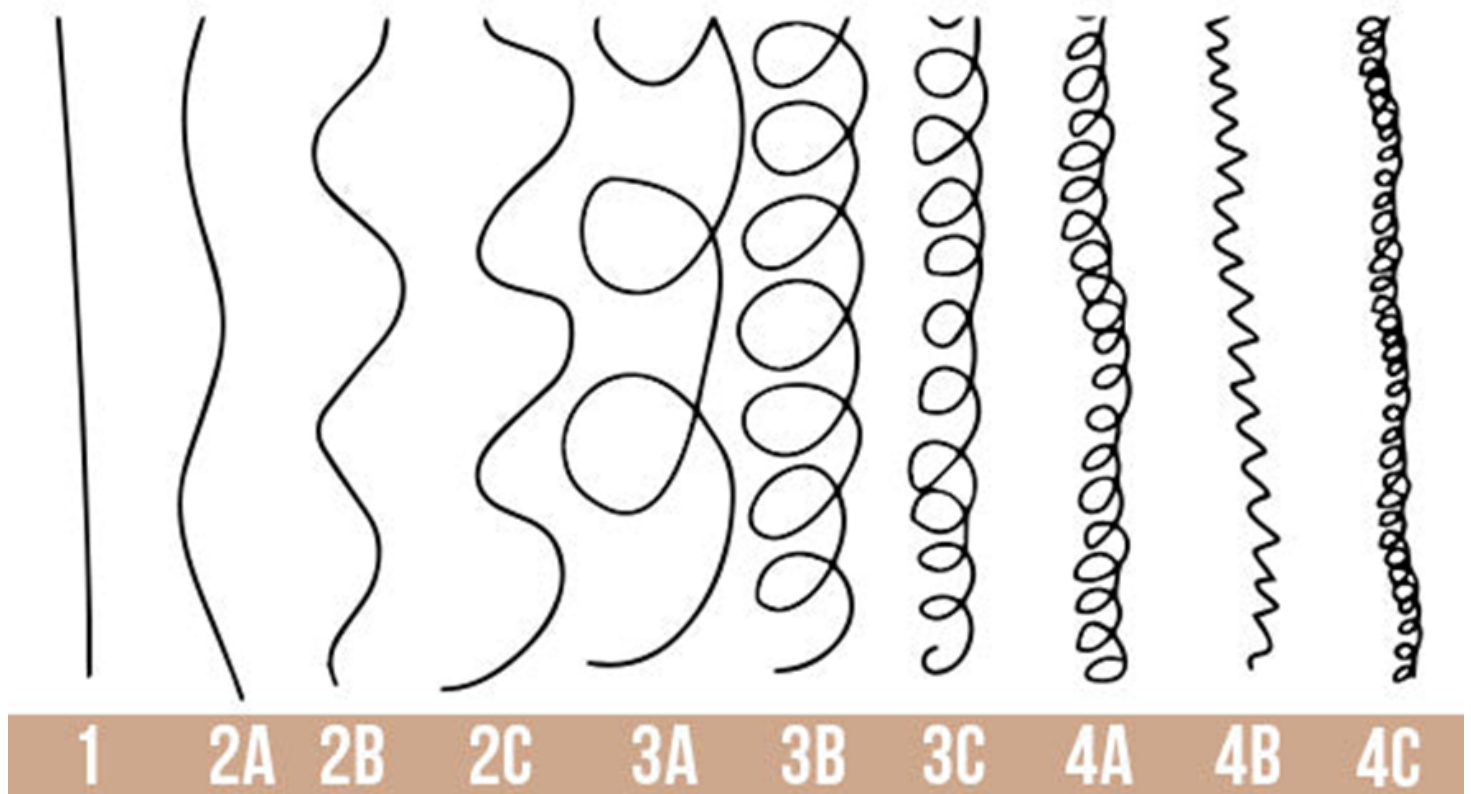

There are different types of hair textures



African Afro hair is not the same, and as a result of the different characteristics, it makes it challenging to care for African hair in various weather seasons, especially if you do not know your afro hair type.

Awareness of your afro hair type could help prevent hair growth issues and improve hair growth, because you will be able to maintain it appropriately.

Black women mainly have type 4A hair, which takes a tight coil shape.

The sub-classifications of Afro hair from A to C were based on the width or diameter of the wave, curl, or coil pattern.

Here is a complete guide on all Afro hair types.

It is generally classified into 3 curl types:-

- **Type 4A** has the widest pattern. The curls are packed tightly with a spiral pattern and can be easily dehydrated and damaged, which means it is essential that your hair care routine helps to address this. Using thicker natural emollients, such as mangoes or shea butter, can help to style it after washing.
- **Type 4B** curl is tighter, but less defined. The afro hair bends into sharp angles like the letter Z. The strands of hair may be anywhere from fine and thin to wiry and coarse, depending on the woman rocking these curls. Protect hair before shampooing with coconut or castor oil to help maintain their natural oils.
- **Type 4C** is similar to 4 B, in that the hair is densely packed. However, this type of hair experiences less definition and greater shrinkage. The strands were tightly coiled and incredibly delicate. The texture may range from super fine to thin, to wiry and coarse.. Protect 4C hair with leave-in to use to protect the delicate curls

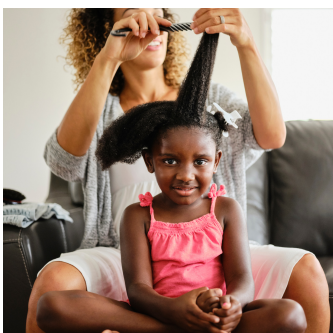
