KS1 Lesson Plan

Theme: Standing Firm in Power and Pride

Duration: 45 minutes





Learning Objectives

- Understand that "standing firm" means being brave and not giving up.
- Learn about Black leaders who showed strength and pride.
- Express ideas through storytelling, drawing, or role-play.



Keywords:

- Brave not scared to do the right thing
- **Strong** using your mind and heart, not just muscles
- **Fairness** treating everyone equally
- **Pride** feeling happy about who you are
- Helping making things better for others

Success Criteria:

- I can tell a story about someone who stood firm.
- I can share why it's good to be proud of who you are.
- I can show what I've learned in my own way (drawing, acting, or speaking).

Starter Activity (5 minutes)



- Show a picture of Rosa Parks and Marcus Rashford.
- Ask: What do you notice about them? Why do you think they are important?
- Use simple story prompts: Rosa said "No" when something was unfair.
- Marcus helps children have food.



Main Input (15 minutes)



Storytelling Time

- Read a short-illustrated story or teacher summary about Rosa Parks.
- Share Marcus Rashford's story of helping children with free school meals.



Discussion

- Ask: How were Rosa and Marcus brave?
- Explain that standing firm means being steady, strong, and doing the right thing.





Group Activity (15 minutes):



Options for children to choose:

- Drawing task: Draw Rosa Parks on the bus or Marcus helping children.
- Role-play task: Act out Rosa saying "No" or Marcus giving food to children.
- Talk task: Share a time when they were proud or helped someone.

Differentiation:

- Provide sentence starters for writing ("Rosa was brave because...")
- Allow drawing or speaking instead of writing for younger learners.



Reflection / Plenary (10 minutes)

Circle time: How can we be brave or proud in school?

Pass around a "kindness stone" – each child shares one way to stand firm.

Cross-Curricular Links

English/Phonics: Story retelling and sentence writing. **History:** Introduction

to key figures in history.

PSHE: Confidence, bravery, and

fairness. Art/Drama: Drawing and role-

play activities.

Teacher Notes (Guidance)

- Use child-friendly language.
- Keep stories short with pictures.
- Allow flexibility: not all children need to write, focus on expression and understanding.
- Praise children for sharing their own examples of bravery.
